To Whom It May Concern,

Mary Caroline Crisp's mental health has been evaluated and reviewed. I am familiar with the patient's symptomology, history and limitations imposed by their disability.

Mary Caroline Crisp has been diagnosed with a mental health disorder recongnized in the DSM-5, which involves symptoms including anxiety. This diagnosis substantially limits one or more of my patient's major life activities. This diagnosis meets the definition of disability under the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Fair Housing Act, and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 §504.

In order to help reduce impairment and alleviate difficulties as a result of Mary Caroline Crisp's diagnosis, I am recommending emotional support animal to accompany them. Reasonable accommodations should be given to Mary Caroline Crisp and they should be allowed to live with their emotional support animal.

This letter meets the legal requirements under the (Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968)), Section504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Pub. L. No. 93-112, 87 Stat. 394 (Sept. 26, 1973), codified at 29U.S.C. 5 701 et seq.), the Americans with Disabilities Act (Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Pub. L. No. 101-336, 104 Stat. 328 (1990). and The Department of Transportation (DOT) 14 CFR Part382 "final order" (12/02/2020)

This assessment and accommodations are valid for one year from the date of issuance. The pet owner assumes all responsibility for the training, safety, cleanliness, health and conduct of their animal at all times.
